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Story Summary: God's Plan for Peace

Today's story takes place during the invasion of Judah by the Assyrians in the late eighth century BCE. During this invasion, the king of Assyria sent an army to place a siege on Jerusalem. This siege came as a result of Hezekiah (pronounced Hez-a-KAI-uh), the king of Judah, standing up against the Assyrians by making religious changes and forming alliances with other kingdoms. The king of Assyria questions God's ability to deliver the people of Judah from their suffering. He attempts to break the relationship of trust that the people have with their king, Hezekiah, by sending a messenger to talk to them. When Hezekiah hears the words of this messenger, he turns to Isaiah for help, and Isaiah offers him words of hope and peace from God.

The Point

God's promises of goodness and peace still stand in the face of challenges. Hezekiah trusted that God would deliver Judah from the hand of the Assyrians. Hezekiah preached this message, even though the king of Assyria attempted to make the people think otherwise. Isaiah also knew that God would bring peace and goodness into the world. Both Hezekiah and Isaiah knew that the vision of the world told in Isaiah 2 would be fulfilled, and they trusted in God's promise in spite of challenges.






ISAIAH AND THE SERAPHIM

Spend time listening to an elder.

Saturday—Read 2 Kings 23:21-30

Josiah's reign and reform, part 4.

For the rest of the day, put away something that gets in the way of your relationship with God.
