

BACKGROUND

Making Connections

The people of Israel continue to stray from what God desires for them, but God continues to keep the promises that were made to them. This is the first Sunday of Advent, where we wait in anticipation and hope for the promised Messiah. This passage shares a vision for the future that we still hope for: a future where God's people are safe and out of harm's way and where a king—the Messiah—will rule with justice.

Story Summary: A Righteous Branch

The prophet Jeremiah shares a message from God: God will send the Messiah to Israel and Judah. The Messiah will bring safety and security to the people and all will know that God is present among them. God's people in Jerusalem were being attacked by the Babylonians. The city was captured, and the temple was destroyed, leading to the time of the Babylonian exile. A prophecy such as the one from Jeremiah must have seemed unbelievable in a world of turmoil. In the midst of these battles, the people are expecting a Messiah who would be a great military leader and victor. The infant king that is coming is not the type of king for which the people were hoping.

The Point

God will send the Messiah to bring about God's kingdom on earth. Throughout the Old Testament lessons, we continue to hear about God keeping promises to the people of Israel, even as they continue to stray from God's path. At this point, their city and temple are in ruins, yet

Jeremiah and the prophets continue to promise a Messiah who would bring about the promised kingdom. Yet God's kingdom is not one that is brought through earthly battle, but the work of justice and peace.







LAST WEEK
